Public Relations 101: Getting the Word Out

Your chapter may be one of the most active in the nation or maybe it needs more members to become a little more effective. Either way, public relations can be a powerful tool if you are willing to invest a little time. In a nutshell, public relations is the practice of spreading the word about your organization and its activities. Done well, it can create a positive image for your group and heighten interest in the cause.

It is important to think about who you are trying to reach. As your chapter works to plan successful events and spread a message, pinpoint whether you are trying to engage fellow students, teachers, the local community or all of the above, and figure out where they get their information. That is where you need to place your message.

Once you identify your audience, think about what they will find interesting. Why should they attend? What information can you include that will help them connect personally with what you are doing? All of those things should be addressed when you are creating your flier, announcement or invitation. If you are raising money, you need to explain what result the money will provide and how that result benefits the donor.

The media can be a great tool but right now local newspapers and TV stations are often understaffed so you need to sell them on why this is newsworthy. The best way to learn that is to watch the news, read the newspaper and think about the stories they run. What do they typically write about? How can you tie what your SAVE chapter is doing to those themes? The media likes tips, numbers and statistics. For example, if you are promoting teen safe driving, find a statistic on the number of teens involved in accidents each year and use that to explain why you are promoting this cause. If you are raising money for a project at your school, try to find some information to support how effective your chapter is in keeping the school a peaceful learning environment. Maybe your administration can provide you with information on the number of days the school has gone without a fight to help you with that.

Many stories in the media have ties to violence and SAVE has many tips and resources that you can use to your advantage. After you have done your homework on your local newspapers and television stations, you should be able to identify the individuals that would most likely write about SAVE. *SAVE Board Secretary*

Public Relations 101... continued

Give them a call or send them an email to say hello. Remember they are very busy so keep it brief but tell them your name, what SAVE is, and a little about your chapter. Close by telling them that any time they are doing a story about youth violence, you would be happy to help. Give them your contact information and keep in mind that if they do reach out to you, they will be on a tight deadline so you want to get back to them as soon as possible. If they see you can do that, they will be more likely to use you again.

In summary, it is important to get the word out about what your chapter is doing so it will continue to grow and flourish. Every time you plan something new, identify the Who, What, When, Where and Why to help you spread the message. Identify who is responsible for getting this on the morning announcements, who will create a flier or who will post it online. Make sure someone is always taking pictures of your efforts and use those in your outreach. There are many resources online that can provide more detail on how to launch a successful PR campaign.
