Chapter Highlight: Hunters Creek Middle School (NC)

Ferguson City Hall received some holiday cheer from schoolchildren in North Carolina. As part of their SAVE service project, students from Hunters Creek Middle School in Jacksonville, N.C. decided they wanted to reach out to the mayor and leaders of Ferguson. A high school student donated a small Christmas tree, and the students decided to each create messages for peace on ornaments to decorate it.

“We thought that maybe nobody else would consider doing something like this for the government leaders,” said Carol Jackson, a social worker and SAVE Advisor for the Onslow County Schools. “It just seemed like they needed a boost.”

“I think everyone needs to join forces to rebuild Ferguson,” said 7th grader MacKenzie Koziol after finishing her ornament. Peace on earth, she added, overcomes violence.”

For 6th grader Elizabeth Turner, the Christmas decorating represented a simple holiday message. “I wanted to say everybody should be safe and happy for the holidays,” she said.

The tree was displayed at city hall, upstairs just outside the office of Mayor James Knowles III. He said it was interesting to learn that even though not all of the kids in the group agreed with the grand jury’s decision not to charge Wilson, they all could agree on one thing -- coming together for peace. “That’s what we’re focused on as well,” Knowles said.
