Monthly Focus: Social Media Safety

SAVE encourages students to be extremely careful when using the internet and social media. Messages posted in any kind of a public forum can be read by anyone. Personal information such as name, address (home and email), telephone number, school name, or information on family and friends should never be shared with anyone you meet in cyberspace or on social media. Never reveal anything about other people that could possibly get them into trouble. It is important to remember that people you meet online, whether in a chatroom or message forum, may not be who they say they are. Also be careful not to provide any personal details, including locations, on your social media sites. The approaching end of the traditional school year calendar is a good time to

SAVE Chapter Highlight: Leflore County High School

Leflore County High School in Itta Bena, Mississippi has been a new participant in the SAVE-Allstate Teen Safe Driving program during the 2013-14 school year and has held events focusing on school and driving safety. In October during America's Safe School Week, a guest speaker from the Greenwood Juvenile Detention Center addressed all the staff and students about the perils of bullying,



fighting, texting, and school safety issues. The Chapter sponsored a "No Texting & Driving" poster contest and organized an informational Q&A session during lunch periods where alternatives to violence were discussed. Allstate Agents Billy & Winnie Walker from the Allstate Greenwood, MS office have been very supportive of the SAVE Chapter's efforts and spoke to students during an assembly about the dangers of texting and driving. The SAVE Advisor at Leflore County High School is Gail Rias.


Action into Art Contest -- Deadline: June 30
