"Twenty Twinkling Stars" are three words that will soon bring comfort and wide smiles across the faces of millions. The book was written to honor and pay tribute to the twenty children who lost their lives at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Connecticut. In addition, Twenty Twinkling Stars, written for ages 3-7, celebrates every child in the world. Laurie Schloff, Senior Coaching Partner at the Speech Improvement Company, is the author of this wonderful children's book, scheduled for release on June 14th. Laurie stressed the significance of the release date in that it marks the six-month anniversary of the fatal Sandy Hook massacre.

The team researched many groups and felt that National SAVE's focus on youth and violence prevention was the ideal organization to support. Further proving her love of non-violence, Laurie is generously donating all proceeds from the sale of the book to National SAVE.

When asked to give a brief glimpse into the book, Laurie stated each star in the twinkling group of twenty has different interests, likes, dislikes, and activities. The book honors the passions and interest of the Sandy Hook children, such as their love of learning, sports and tacos! The twenty twinkling stars in the book are watched over by the six "Protecting Stars", which are a tribute to the six educators who perished at Sandy Hook Elementary while protecting the children.

Lena Warnke, a college student and illustrator of "Twenty Twinkling Stars" feels the book will impact the nation by being a great conversation starter, and a way to remember and celebrate the lives of all children in a positive, peaceful, manner. Lena stated she was proud to be a part of creating this legacy for all to enjoy. AWARENESS

Many activities can be conducted before National Youth Violence Prevention Week to bring awareness to your campaign:

Teacher Workshop

- ✓ conduct a teacher workshop and share tips, lesson plans and ideas for teachers to use during the week.

Awareness Posters

- ✓ create awareness posters that list the daily activities that will occur during the week

One in Four

- ✓ place purple and orange ribbons on lockers before school starts. Place purple ribbons on all lockers except the fourth locker where you place an orange ribbon. This represents the statistic that one in every four students will be affected by violence this year.



Manage Your Anger- Sponsored by The American School Counselor Association

Don't let anger heat you up!

- ✓ provide students with free hot chocolate or fireballs with the above phrase attached

Pledge to be Fight Free

- ✓ conduct a contest between grades to see how many students will pledge to remain fight free

Role Plays

- ✓ illustrate positive ways to deal with specific situations such as being bullied or theft

Exercise the Anger Away

- ✓ use physical education classes to demonstrate healthy ways exercise can be used to release anger and stress



Support Safety - Sponsored by National Association of Youth Courts

Poster Contest

- ✓ Conduct a safety-themed poster contest. Display and let students or faculty judge.

Crime Stoppers

- ✓ start a school crime watch program that includes an anonymous tip line or suggestion box

Safety Day

- ✓ coordinate a safety day with local rescue agencies providing exhibits and activities

School Safety Committee

- ✓ volunteer to serve on a school safety committee and encourage accurate incident reporting

- ✓ if students and faculty can go so many days fight free the entire school receives a reward such as an ice cream cone or early release on Friday

- ✓ organize a service project where all students and members of a community can come together and make a difference

Peace Murals

- ✓ paint a peace mural over graffiti or provide sidewalk chalk to students to create a peace sidewalk

Adopt-a-student

- ✓ institute a program where younger students are paired with older students

Fingerprinting

- ✓ coordinate a fingerprinting afternoon. Work with local law enforcement and parent to fingerprint young children

Optimism Preventive Services, Georgetown, SC

Teens from Georgetown and Williamsburg counties attended the Teen Dating Violence Awareness Workshop, hosted by the SAVE Chapter from Optimism Preventive Services, and took the “Stop the Dating Violence Pledge”. With a 40% attendance increase from 2011, the facilitators included: Chanda Robinson, (Georgetown Law Enforcement), Alma Sierra and Donna Sherrill, (Georgetown County Sheriff Department); Bevelyn Mitchell, MSHS (Rape Crisis Center), and Officer Johnathan Guiles (Georgetown Law Enforcement). Melissa Bell, (SCDDJ) was the workshop moderator. Parents attended a session facilitated by Donna Watkins of Family Justice. Domestic Violence Survivor Michelle Williams shared her testimony with adult participants and Dr. Celeste Pringle, Asst. Superintendent, Georgetown County School District, got the teens motivated with a vibrant welcome.

“Youth empowerment” ... when these two words are used together, SAVE will make an impact. What does this mean to your chapter? Well, just let your students’ creative juices flow. Our chapter did just that three years ago. Our SAVE students came up with a slogan and an idea for an event that we have continued every year since. Students hear about it word of mouth and want to participate every year. It’s one of the first questions I get from new chapter members and from members of the student body in general – when is the “Silence the Violence” day?

In recognition of Youth Violence Prevention Week, our students came up with a way for them to show solidarity against violence. They wanted to be silent for the day to show that violence is not the way to solve problems. So they came up with the slogan “Silence the Violence.” We create t-shirts that have the slogan on them and sell them for \$5. This is not a fund-raising event. They get students to sign a non-violence pledge. And those who do not wear t-shirts will wear a piece of duct tape on their shirts that has written on it “Silence the Violence” or “Get the Violence Out of Our

School” or “No means no!” Students come up with amazing ideas! Youth voices with grown up choices – and today so many of their choices do revolve around things that youth shouldn’t have to make choices about. Violence manifests itself in many forms – bullying, child abuse, domestic violence, hate crimes – just a few (unfortunately). So let your students brainstorm ideas about things that are hitting close to home for them and then empower them to execute on their ideas. Get your PTA/PTSA to help, get other clubs in your school to help, get the class officers to volunteer, team up with one of the sports teams – all of these are sources to help you spread the message that your SAVE members want to share. Good luck with your actions – hope you find a lucky shamrock in your chapter!

A couple of weeks ago there was an incident in my community involving two teens in a relationship. The relationship turned vicious and some of the teens peers thought nothing of it. Unfortunately, our generation has seemingly taken dating violence to the extreme - often resulting in injuries to those we ‘love’. But, this violent trend is not taking root in the heart of our chapter and our school. The initiative for this month is Spread the SAVE. We are inviting people who date to come to meetings, both open and closed meetings, to hear about dating violence. And we are trying a new tactic - “One on Two Conversation”, where individuals involved in harmful relationships can come and talk it out with either one or two peers. Posters are being made to show students alternative ways to leave hindering relationships and are going to be hung in the hallways of our school.
