School is supposed to be a safe place for all. A place young children can regard as their safe haven no matter what circumstance they come from. However, it is the unfortunate truth that over the past several years, incidents of violence have intensified. Disasters like the shooting at Columbine High School, once viewed as long distant dreams, have turned into reoccurring nightmares. Even more troubling, this trend of violence has intensified within schools as well. Fifty years ago, the main disciplinary problems in our schools were running in the halls, talking out of turn, and chewing gum. Today's transgressions include physical and verbal violence, incivility, and in some schools, drug abuse, robbery, assault, and murder. A recent study run by CNN has reported that in the past 18 months, there have been 74 school shootings. Moreover, in a 2012 survey by the National School Safety Center, more than 60 percent of high school students reported they could get a gun if they wanted to, and more than 69 stated they know how to get drugs. In what could be a worrying precursor to adult behavior, nearly a quarter of students in this survey reported knowing at least one student in their school who had been a victim of dating violence. There is no clear answer to this disturbing trend in our schools, but the statistics do not lie, and it is clear that action by parents, educators, law enforcement, and students is essential.



While it is clear that crime prevention protocol must be implemented in schools, the procedure implemented is unique to the specific needs of every school. Some examples of administrator action include the enforcement of zero-tolerance policies towards the presence of weapons, alcohol, and illegal drugs, the development of protocols between law enforcement and the school about ways to share information on at-risk youth, and the involvement of teens in designing and running programs such as mediation, mentoring, peer assistance, SAVE, etc. Although administrative action is central to establishing a safe school environment, parents and students have an equally important role in this process. Parents can help in many ways, for example by teaching their children to resolve problems without fighting, and by regularly talking to their children and monitoring computer use and warning signs such as sudden drops in grades and losses of friendships, etc. The options administrators, parents, and students have to implement crime prevention strategies are endless, but one thing is clear—this disturbing trend of violence and crime in our schools must put stopped.

Cuthbertson High School, Waxhaw, NC

The Cuthbertson High School SAVE Chapter has hit the ground running this school year! They conducted activities for the International Day of Peace on September 21. This year's theme was "We all have a right to peace." The International Day of Peace was first established in 1981 as a day of non-violence and cease-fire by the United Nations General Assembly. It is the hope that each year on this day, millions of people participate in activities, events, concerts and festivals to raise awareness of the need for peace. The SAVE club sold shirts that read "We are all Cavaliers" on the front and "We all deserve to walk in the sun" on the back. The money raised by the shirts was donated to the Turning Point in Monroe, NC which is a domestic violence shelter. "Domestic violence is, unfortunately, a problem everywhere. Our SAVE club wants to help support the members of our community who are affected and remind the families that they are not alone," said SAVE Adviser Leah Ross.

The SAVE Chapter also hosted the school's first blood drive of the year on September 12 sponsored by the Community Blood Center of the Carolinas. Many students and teachers came by to donate blood, hoping that they will save at least one life. Students from SAVE volunteered their time to help as well. Volunteers and donors received t-shirts that read, "I Give Blood Because I'm Awesome." "Volunteering is something that I am passionate about and it is a way to help my school out, as well as the people running the blood drive," said senior Mitchell Wesoly. Giving students and teachers the opportunity to donate blood teaches them what it really means to give back to the community.
