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Students Against Violence Everywhere Recognizes National Student, Advisor and Chapter of the Year

Raleigh, North Carolina – March 21, 2015 – The National Association of Students Against Violence Everywhere, a nationwide nonprofit dedicated to decreasing the potential for violence in schools and communities, is honoring its exceptional participants for making a difference in their communities. As part of the organization's annual awards program, SAVE has selected two Students of the Year, two Chapters of the Year and one Advisor of the Year, each nominated by community members from across the country and recognized for their outstanding efforts in preventing violence in our schools.

SAVE's Student of the Year awards went to:

- Leo Myers from White Oak High School in Jacksonville. Myers co-founded his SAVE chapter and has
 served as president for two years. He continually demonstrates outstanding commitment to SAVE
 ideals by mediating his peers' arguments, participating in crime prevention activities and reaching out
 to local elementary schools. He recently helped raise money for a boy with cancer from a local church
 by collecting and donating bottle caps. Myers was nominated by last year's SAVE Student of the Year,
 Zachary Bakke.
- Sydney Gilbert from Mukwonago High School in Mukwonago, Wisconsin. Gilbert has been president of
 her school's chapter for two years and has initiated numerous activities and campaigns to promote
 respect, non-violence and mitigate bullying in her community. Most notably, she began the school's
 first "True Beauty" day to promote self-confidence and positivity throughout the school. She was
 nominated by the school advisor, Sarah Dianich.

SAVE's Chapter of the Year awards went to:

- Lockhart Elementary School in the U.S. Virgin Islands. This chapter, led by advisor JoAnne Saunders, has taken a unique approach to promoting peace through various forms of performing arts. It stages monthly rallies during which students perform songs, dances and skits conveying anti-bullying messages.
- Cuthbertson High School in Waxhaw. This SAVE chapter is led by advisor Leah Ross and was
 nominated by Heather Karpinski, the school's media center specialist and a parent of one of the
 chapter members. This year the chapter made a large impact on the nonprofit Turning Point, a local
 shelter for victims of domestic violence, by hosting numerous fundraisers and volunteering.
 Additionally, it has organized canned food drives, equality celebrations, safe driving initiatives and
 teen dating abuse workshops for students.

The SAVE Advisor of the Year award went to Officer Daisy Watson, the advisor for the Biloxi High School chapter in Mississippi. Officer Watson's students credit her with turning SAVE into one of the biggest clubs at Biloxi High, boasting more than 60 members. She has coordinated countless impactful activities, most notably a DUI reenactment with real police, firemen and an ambulance. Officer Watson's dedication to SAVE has made a tremendous impact on the students and has contributed greatly to the drop in violence and drug use on campus.

"Each of these award winners truly embodies the ideals of Students Against Violence Everywhere," said Carleen Wray, executive director of SAVE. "Their commitment to their schools and the local communities exemplify honor, dignity and community pride, and their work is helping keep students safe across our country. The winners were revealed at the SAVE Summit, which was held March 21 at the McKimmon Center at N.C. State University in Raleigh. More than 300 people attended, including SAVE participants, students, teachers, law enforcement, dropout prevention coordinators, social workers, counselors and parents.
